What's in the Farm Bill?


Title I: Commodities Provides support for major commodity crops, including wheat, corn, soybeans, peanuts, rice, dairy, and sugar, as well as disaster assistance.	Title II: Conservation Encourages environmental stewardship of farmlands and improved management through land retirement programs, working lands programs, or both.	Title III: Trade Supports U.S. agricultural export programs and international food assistance programs	Title IV: Nutrition Provides nutrition assistance for low- income households through programs, including the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
Title V: Credit Offers direct government loans and guarantees to producers to buy land and operate farms and ranches	Title VI: Rural Development Supports rural housing, community facilities, business, and utility programs through grants, loans, and guarantees	Title VII: Research Supports agricultural research and extension programs to expand academic knowledge and help producers be more productive	Title VIII: Forestry Supports forestry management programs run by USDA's Forest Service
Title IX: Energy Encourages the development of farm and community renewable energy systems through various programs, including grants and loan guarantees	Title X: Horticulture Supports the production of specialty crops, USDA-certified organic foods, and locally produced foods and authorizes a regulatory framework for industrial hemp	Title XI: Crop Insurance Enhances risk management through the permanently authorized Federal Crop Insurance Program	Title XII: Miscellaneous Includes programs and assistance for livestock and poultry production, support for beginning farmers and ranchers, and other miscellaneous and general provisions







Figure 1. Farm Bill Titles with Mandatory Baseline (billions of dollars, 10-year projected outlays, FY2025-FY2034)





Figure 1. Permanent Law Relative to Current Market Prices and the 2018 Farm Bill




